Would you like to contribute to a study about infertility and childlessness?

During the interview, you will be asked a series of questions about your thoughts, feelings, and experiences related to your infertility and childlessness.

"Where do I have to go?"

You will meet with this researcher in a private setting, such as at The Wright Institute in Berkeley, or at a convenient location of your choosing.

"Can my answers be traced back to me?

With the exception of a signed consent form, which, legally, must be stored in the confidential files of The Wright Institute, all identifying information will be removed from all other documentation, and will not appear in the final results.

"Who is eligible to participate?"

Women age 60 and older who identify as infertile and as involuntarily childless may participate. Participants must not have (or have had) any biological, adopted, step, or foster children.
